It was also transferred to port communities and sailors' home regions through regular contact between sailors speaking this sociolect and the land-based service-providers and communities that

maintained and supplied the fleets. Linguistic data show that morphological characteristics of Ship English are evident at the word-level, and syntactic characteristics are evident not only in phrase construction but also at the larger clause and sentence levels, whilst discourse is marked by characteristic patterns of subordination and culture-specific interjection patterns.
