These findings revealed the overall stress prevalence was high among TU medical students as compared to other or similar populations in Saudi Arabia and Middle Eastern countries. Among students who had high stress, attitude, subjective norm, and behavioral perceived control scores were found statistically significant predictors of intention to practice SMTs. On the other hand, among high-stress students who never practiced SMTs, stress knowledge, attitude,

subjective norm, behavioral perceived control, demographic and stressor scores were tested and only behavioral perceived control and gender were found statistically significant predictors of intention for practicing SMTs. Surprisingly, the environmental, family and academic stressors were not found significant predictors of intention.
